




Intention: to create 3-dimensional paper spherical structures.

Challenged: by geometry, the study of triangles, their relationships, and how I





cut, fold and sew them into my preconceived form and shape.

Cut into triangular shapes, folded and sewn together, they became abstractons.

I began asking - how does one experience a garden?








And I began....and I continued sewing.

Now - 16' long.






More experimenting Alternative hangings.
